By embracing initiatives such as affirmative action, the administration gained favor with these groups and legitimized a thinly cloaked gambit to bolster their power over the faculty. As troubling as this trend has become, there are ways to reverse it. *The Fall of the Faculty* outlines how we can revamp the system so that real educators can regain their voice in curriculum policy.
